

STORY SNATCHERS

Uh-oh! Some stories have gone missing from the library...
snatched away by a mysterious green hand!
Build your own Snatcher Hands and use them to
collect the Story Coins.

Instructions

Prepare:

- **Story Snatcher Hands:** Cut out the hands and tape each one to a pencil (one pair per player).
- **Story Coins:** Cut out all 20 coins. Fold on the gray line and glue blank sides together with a glue stick.
- **Library Pocket:** Cut along the solid outline. Fold on the gray lines, then tape the sides to form a pocket. Use it to store your coins and keep track of your score.
- **Scorecards:** Cut out extra scorecards if you'd like to play more rounds.

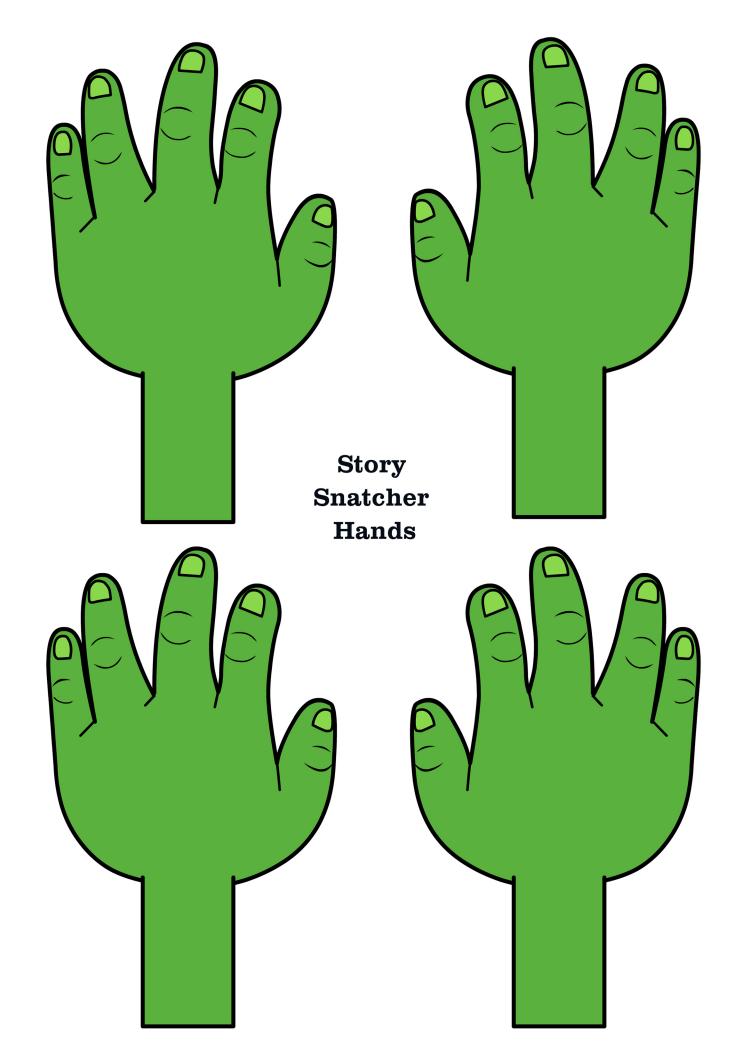


How to Play:

- **1.** Place all the *Story Coins* in a pile.
- 2. Take turns using your Snatcher Hands to pick up one coin.
- **3.** Read the title and author aloud, then place the *Story Coin* inside your *Library Pocket* using only your *Snatcher Hands*! If you can't complete this in **15 seconds**, return the coin to the pile.
- **4.** Keep playing until all coins are collected.
- **5.** Check the point value (1–5) on each coin and record it on your *Library Pocket*. Add up your points the player with the highest score wins!

By the end, you'll have discovered 20 amazing stories. Use the blank *Story Coins* to add in some of your own favorites!

Warned of the dangers of peer pressure.

The Adventures of Pinocchio by Carlo Collodi 1883

The illustrated scenes were directly influenced from the author's travels.

The Tale of Peter Rabbit by Beatrix Potter

1902

Originally a bedtime story for his children. Tolkien also drew Middle-earth's map!

The Hobbit by J.R.R. Tolkien 1937

Shaped by the author's time spent in the Swiss mountains.

Heidi by Johanna Spyri 1880
